TOWN OF CINCO BAYOU
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March 17, 1977

Town officials in attendance: Mayor Jim Kendrick, Council members Phil Johnston, Will Overstreet, Harold Peek, and Max Usrey; Attorney Rick Powell and Recorder Dee Rouse. Absent: Council member Irene Balsley and Town Marshal Robert Waddell.

Also present were: Mrs. Max Usrey, Adelia Robblee, Abbie Tyner, Cathy Peek, Mrs. Harold Peek, Joyce Smith, Mr. & Mrs. Ronald Gibson, Ralph Perry, Honey Reeves representing Playground Daily News, Mr. & Mrs. J. T. Culley, and Otis Gossman representing Pensacola News Journal.

Therefore, a quorum being present, Mayor Kendrick opened the meeting with a silent prayer at 7:30 p.m.

1. MINUTES-REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING-FEBRUARY 17, 1977. Motion by Mr. Usrey to approve as printed, seconded by Mr. Peek. Motion carried unanimously.
2. FINANCIAL STATEMENT-FEBRUARY 1977. Motion by Mr. Usrey to approve as presented, seconded by Mr. Peek. Motion carried unanimously.
3. EMPLOYEES RAISES. Motion by Mr. Peek to approve employees raises, seconded by Mr. Johnston. Motion carried unanimously.
4. PERSONNEL POLICY #1-PERTAINING TO ANNUAL LEAVE, SICK LEAVE AND PAID HOLIDAYS.

Motion by Mr. Peek to approve Personnel Policy Letter #1 granting two weeks annual leave and two weeks sick leave to employees after one year's employment, also paid holidays, seconded by Mr. Johnston. In discussion, Mr. Overstreet requested that sick leave be used for treatment by Health Care Professionals. Mr. Peek agreed to amend his motion to include this. Mr. Overstreet also question the effective date of January 4, 1977. Mr. Peek indicated this was to make it from one year to another to keep the records straight. Motion carried unanimously.


5. MOSQUITO CONTROL/LANDFILL PROGRAM BILLING. Mayor Kendrick indicated we had received a letter from the County Commissioner's finance officer correcting a previous billing for Mosquito Control and Landfill Program. (Previous billing was for \$1650 for fiscal year 1975-76 and \$825 for first two quarters of fiscal year 1976-77. This billing is for \$1375 and \$687.50). Motion by Mr. Usrey to pay this billing, seconded by Mr. Overstreet. In discussion, Mr. Johnston questioned what portion of this billing was to be passed on to our Garbage Contractor, since the County didn't give us a breakdown as to what went for Mosquito Control and what went for Landfill. Mayor Kendrick suggested Councilman in charge of Utilities come up with a recommendation as to what we would charge Garbage Contractor. Motion carried unanimously.

6. KIDD BAYOU. Motion by Mr. Overstreet to ask Fort Walton to amend their permit request to include our side of Kidd Bayou and our participation not to exceed \$600, seconded by Mr. Usrey. Motion carried unanimously.

7. FRANCIS PARK. Mr. Johnston had no further information on park pertaining to erection of sea wall. Mr. Kendrick indicated he had run across an article in one of the State's bulletins pertaining to grants for parks. He indicated he had asked our City Manager to write them for further information.

8. ZONING ORDINANCE CHANGE-TO ALLOW MARINA C-2. After an explanation to the attending public and some discussion on the proposed ordinance, Mr. Overstreet moved that the ordinance be read, so the people who came about it could hear what we were talking about, seconded by Mr. Johnston. In discussion, it was determined that this was to be an "Explanatory Reading Only." VOTE: Yeas-Mr. Peek, Mr. Johnston and Mr. Overstreet; Nays-None; Abstaining-Mr. Usrey. Attorney read the ordinance. Discussion followed. MOTION: Mr. Peek moved that Council deny the idea of changing the ordinance to include the marina, seconded by Mr. Usrey. Additional discussion followed. Opposition to marinas in Cinco Bayou was heard from Mrs. Peek, Mrs. Usrey and Mrs. Smith. Mayor Kendrick indicated he had received letters from other property owners opposing this ordinance change. VOTE: Yeas-Mr. Peek and Mr. Usrey; Nays-Mr. Overstreet and Mr. Johnston. Therefore, to break a tie, Mayor Kendrick cast his vote nay.
9. PROBLEMS ON SEAWAY. Property owner, Mrs. Harold Peek informed Council of the problems about children skating late hours of the night around the bank; automobile and boat blocking driveway of her home; littering on her property. Mayor Kendrick asked Clerk to investigate the problem and take any action necessary. Mr. Peek reminded Council that First Federal had agreed to regulate traffic. He asked if it would be alright to ask them to provide security guards for this purpose. Clerk suggested that since the ordinance gave them the use of this property during a specific period of time and it does indicate that they would regulate it, could we have our Attorney write the bank and indicate this problem and ask them to regulate it. Mayor approved this suggestion and directed Clerk to put on agenda for next committee meeting. Mr. Powell indicated he would request in his letter that they have a representative at next committee meeting.
10. JURISDICTION OVER SKIERS, SWIMMERS AND BOATERS. Mrs. Joyce Smith ask Council who had jurisdiction over skiers, swimmers and boaters at the end of the ramp at Seaway. Mayor Kendrick indicated that she should call the Marina Control or Sheriff Department.
11. ADJOURNMENT. Meeting adjourned at 8:42 p.m.
12. RECONVENING OF COUNCIL. Immediately after adjournment, it was brought to Mayor Kendrick's attention of his vote on Item 8. Attorney recommended meeting be reconvened to clarify his vote. Mayor Kendrick reconvened the Council and changed his vote to yea. Meeting then adjourned.



SUBJECT: PERSONNEL POLICY #1 - Pertaining to Annual Leave, Sick Leave and Paid Holidays.

TO : TOWN EMPLOYEES

1. This policy covers all full time employees of the Town of Cinco Bayou.

2. The Town Clerk will maintain the personnel records, and insure that appropriate personnel functions are carried out, including maintenance of leave and attendance records.

3. ANNUAL LEAVE: After one year's employment, employees will be granted two weeks annually.

4. SICK LEAVE: After one year's employment, employees will be granted two weeks annually. This leave to be used for treatment by Health Care Professionals.

5. PAID HOLIDAYS:


A. Employees are granted the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

B. When a holiday falls on Saturday, the preceding Friday is observed. When a holiday falls on Sunday, the following Monday is observed.

C. The Mayor or Council may designate additional holidays.


6. Effective date of this Policy will be January 4, 1977.

Dear Mr. Godwin:

This letter is in response to your correspondence dated February 28, 1977 whereby you requested information relative to Cinco Bayou's share of the County Mosquito Control and Landfill Program.

There is no way to determine what percentage of your billing is for Mosquito Control and what percentage is for Landfill. As you know the State of Florida considers this operation as one program and does not specify between Landfill and Mosquito Control. In reference to the formula used to determine each cities share, I have found no such formula and can only relay that the amounts are established by the Board of County Commissioners.

I concur that Cinco Bayou's annual assessment should be \$1,375.00 instead of \$1,650.00 as previously billed. This error occurred due to a motion to increase rates by 50% that was later reduced to 25% and your billing was not adjusted accordingly.

To recap the amount due from Cinco Bayou, \$1,375.00 due from fiscal year 1975-76 and \$687.50 is due for the first two quarters of fiscal year 1976-77. Total due at this time \$2,062.50.

If I can be of any additional assistance, please let me know.



Zairean forces, bolstered by emergency U.S. and Belgian military aid, said thousands of invaders which it hinted were Soviet-backed Cuban troops were advancing through the copper-rich region but avoiding any engagement with government units.

Government sources said the invaders were "welcomed as liberators" by some Zaireans in towns they captured.

The government confirmed Thursday a small town — Sandoa, 55 miles from the Angolan border — has fallen to the rebels, who overran Dilolo, Kapanga, and Kisenge shortly after they invaded Zaire last week.

But the Zairean news agency AZAP early Friday denied reports by a foreign news agency (not UPI) that the invaders had overrun Kowezi, a city of 200,000 persons that is the center of the nation's copper industry.

"The town has not fallen into the hands of the invaders," AZAP said. Government officials said the invaders were very close to the town but had not captured it.

The official said that although the invading force was making advances, the embassy had no plans at the moment to send in an American observer.

The embassy official said the Constructeurs Inga-Shaba construction company, a

"They are launching rockets and missiles to avoid any engagement. They disappear at the approach of reconnaissance planes and never appear during the day."

Road Department Fishes for 'Dozer

MIAMI (UPI) — Dade County Sanitation Department workers went fishing on the job Wednesday. They rowed their little boat out into the slushy Virginia Key trash dump in hopes of hooking a \$65,000 bulldozer and a \$30,000 truck that went under last week.

"Didn't catch anything," said rubbish dump scale clerk Eugene Castiglioni.

A diver was called to the scene late Thursday. He took one look at the sea of sludge and garbage, and didn't even bother to unload his SCUBA tanks.

The whole affair began innocently enough last Saturday. A dump truck got stuck in the muck and the 45,000-pound bulldozer crept over to pull it out. Suddenly both machines began sinking.

"We jumped," said dump truck driver Jim Pinkerton.

Cinco Marina Killed

Cinco Bayou Mayor Jim Kendrick cast a tie-breaking vote to kill any further discussion for allowing marinas in commercially zoned districts of the town.

The vote followed a three-month stalemate in which the council waived on the issue.

On the strength of a turnout of 12 citizens and letters from waterfront property owners, Councilman Harold Peek made a motion to deny making any changes in the current ordinance. In the vote that followed councilmen Max Usrey and Peek were joined by Kendrick in outvoting William Overstreet and Phil Johnston.

Before the vote an "explanatory reading" of an ordinance providing for marinas was heard and opened to discussion. The audience's general opinion was that marinas would create a nuisance to the waterways and the town's streets.

J.T. Culley, speaking out for his right to make a living with his business, told the audience that a marina would bring work into the town as well as taxes.

It was Culley's application to construct Snug Harbor east of the Cinco bridge which brought on the attempt for an ordinance change. Culley's plans, which were dashed by the council's vote, called for a 50-foot slip marina which would harbor boats under 40 feet.

Prior to sentencing, Prosecutor Hank Adorno asked the judge to impose the maximum sentence on Otero.

"He talks of his civil rights—what about the rights of others who want to be able to walk into an airport knowing a locker won't be blown up?" Adorno asked.

After the sentencing Clay told the court that the defense had learned of evidence favorable to the defendant which had been locally suppressed by the police prior to both the federal and state trials. He said the state knew, or should have known of the evidence and if they did not they were "blatantly and wantonly" negligent.

Although Clay would not disclose the evidence in court it was later learned to be a voice tape claiming responsibility of the airport bombing by Colombians.

In a press conference following the sentencing, a calm Otero told the press he was a prisoner of a political system. He again accused the FBI of il-

legal tactics (kidnapping) in his return to the U.S.

Otero accused the FBI of being corrupt and said the interests of the community and the authorities were not the same.

"For 18 years I have fought communism. When we were fighting Castro we were called "Freedom Fighters," then when we become independent in our fight we are called "maniac terrorists," Otero said.

Otero's sentencing did not surprise him. "I expected anything from the minimum to 100 years. The judge conducted himself as prosecutor not as a judge," Otero said claiming his defense had been limited by the judge while the prosecutors were given more freedom.

Otero told the press he hopes a congressional investigation will give credence to his assertions that the FBI was involved in the Kennedy and King assassinations.

Marina Ordinance Voted Down

CINCO BAYOU — A proposed ordinance which would have paved the way for a controversial marina was voted down 3-2 here Thursday night without ever officially going through a first reading.

The effect of the action means that J. T. Culley will not be permitted to build a marina capable of handling 50 boats on a site owned by Town Councilman Phil Johnston.

Mayor Jim Kendrick and Councilmen Harold Peek and Max Usrey voted against the idea of changing the town's ordinance currently prohi-

biting marinas in a commercial zone, while Johnston and Councilman W. E. Overstreet voted for it.

Peek made the motion after saying that "lots of people have told me the town doesn't want a marina."

The proposed ordinance did not deal with a specific marina but would have paved the way for the Culley venture. Culley left immediately after the vote.

Through a wording mixup, however, the first vote would have had the opposite effect and following the meeting town attorney Rick Powell suggested that Kendrick

reconvene the session.

The second time around the vote — still 3-2 — successfully clobbered the marina ordinance. Those who left after the initial vote, including Culley, apparently had no feelings other than that the marina issue was dead.


Prior to the vote, the proposed ordinance was read aloud but not as an official first reading.

Overstreet, in response to attack on the marina zoning from several in the audience, asked: "Do people on the water have more rights to it than people who live inland?" He said he wanted more time to study the proposed ordinance before allowing it to go up for a first reading.

Johnston several times during the session cross-

examined people in the audience who said they opposed a marina for the area.

Joyce Smith said she was against the marina, no matter what. "I live west of the bridge and I am violently opposed," she said. "I feel it will be a nuisance on the waterway and on the streets. I live next to a boat ramp and it's an awful nuisance."

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Cinco Bayou Marina Issue To Be Aired

Cinco Bayou residents will have the opportunity to voice opinions on an ordinance providing for marinas in commercial zones at tonight's 7:30 p.m. town council meeting.

The marina issue has been stalemated before the town council for the past three months and a possible first reading of the ordinance could come tonight.

There must be two reading of the ordinance before it would go into effect.

According to Mayor Jim Kendrick there has been some opposition from residents living east of a proposed marina location at the Cinco Bayou bridge.

There are only two waterfront locations in the town currently zoned commercial. Both are adjacent to the Cinco bridge. The ordinance being prepared would allow marinas to be located only in commercially zoned districts.

The lack of a marina ordinance surfaced when businessman J.T. Culley applied to the council for approval to construct Snug Harbor Marina.

Culley's plans call for 50 boat slips which would permanently harbor boats under 40 feet in length.
