REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
June 15, 1978

Therefore, a quorum being present, Mayor Kendrick opened the meeting with a silent prayer at 7:02 p.m.

1. MINUTES-REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING-MAY 18, 1978. For Matter of Record, an attachment was added to the minutes on a Financial Disclosure, Conflict of Interest Form, which Mr. Johnston had filled out.
2. MINUTES-SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING-MAY 22, 1978. Motion by Mrs. Balsley to accept as printed, seconded by Mr. Peek. Motion carried unanimously.
3. FINANCIAL STATEMENT-MAY 1978. Motion by Mr. Perry to approved as presented, seconded by Mr. Peek. Motion carried unanimously.
4. COMPREHENSIVE PLAN. Mr. Bob Kessler, Senior Planner of the Division of State Planning spoke on the Local Government Comprehensive Plan and provided information to Council on the preparation and development of a plan. Must be completed by July 1, 1979. Clerk will attend the Planning Fund Meeting in Lynn Haven, Florida on the 23rd of June at 2 p.m.
5. ORDINANCE-FINAL READING-AMENDING ZONING ORDINANCE TO INCLUDE UNDER SECTION 7, APPENDIX A, PARAGRAPH, "YACHT BASIN.

Attorney perform the final reading by title only. MOTION by Mr. Johnston to approve the final reading of amending ordinance, motion died for lack of second. MOTION by Mr. Peek to reject the final reading of the amending ordinance, seconded by Mr. Usrey. Motion withdrawn with Counselor's recommendation. After lengthy discussion among Council and the attending public, MOTION by Mr. Peek to reject the final reading of the amending ordinance, seconded by Mr. Usrey. VOTE: YEAS-Usrey and Peek; NAYS-Perry, Balsley and Johnston. After the motion failed, Mr. Johnston moved to approve the final reading of the amending ordinance, seconded by Mr. Perry. VOTE; YEAS-Perry and Johnston; NAYS-Usrey, Peek and Balsley. Later in discussion, Attorney suggested to Council to moved to reconsider the first reading of the ordinance and the approval be rescinded. Mr. Johnston requested the Attorney research the legality of the ordinance and report to the next council meeting.

6. RECISSION OF BUILDING PERMIT FOR YACHT BASIN. MOTION by Mr. Johnston to table this item, seconded by Mr. Perry. VOTE: YEAS-Johnston and Perry; NAYS-Balsley, Usrey and Peek. Motion failed, Mr. Peek moved to withdraw building permit, seconded by Mr. Usrey. VOTE: YEAS-Usrey, Peek and Balsley; NAYS-Johnston and Perry.

7. CIVIL DEFENSE PLAN. Motion by Mr. Johnston to accept Civil Defense Plan as proposed, seconded by Mr. Peek. Motion carried unanimously.
8. AGREEMENT FOR SERVICE-OKALOOSA COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. Motion by Mr. Peek to negotiate with the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Department, seconded by Mrs. Balsley. Clerk read the agreement. Clerk asked Council to allow him to write Salamander Security Systems a letter thanking them for the service they render to the Town. Motion carried unanimously.
9. RESOLUTION-FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM. Motion by Mr. Usrey to designate Council as whole to cooperate with the Administrator of the Flood Insurance Program, seconded by Mr. Peek. Motion carried unanimously. Mayor Kendrick appointed Mr. Perry as Chairman. Motion by Mr. Peek to adopt the resolution, seconded by Mr. Perry. Motion carried unanimously. (Clerk's note: Resolution to be numbered #78-3).
10. LETTER-STATE DOG FLY CONTROL PROGRAM. Motion by Mr. Peek to participate in the State Dog Fly Control Program, seconded by Mrs. Balsley. Motion carried unanimously.
11. LETTER-BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS-CLOSING OF PUBLIC LANDS IN THE VARIOUS INCORPORATED MUNICIPALITIES AND THE UNINCORPORATED AREA OF OKALOOSA COUNTY FLORIDA.

12. FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE FORMS. Clerk passed out forms for all to fill out and turn into the Clerk of Circuit Court Office prior to July 15.
13. APPOINTMENT TO BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT. Mayor Kendrick appointed Mrs. Balsley, Mr. Peek and Mr. Usrey to serve as the Board of Adjustment.
14. RECONSIDERATION OF OKALOOSA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT MEMBERSHIP. Mr. Johnston suggested Council not change the vote of the May 18, 1978 meeting.
15. BUILDING PERMIT-PELHAM INSURANCE AGENCY, LOT 18, BLOCK 16. Motion by Mr. Peek to accept building permit on the Mayor's recommendations, seconded by Mrs. Balsley. Motion carried unanimously.
16. LOT 6, BLOCK 20-REQUEST FOR SHRUBS CUTTING. Mayor Kendrick asked Council to come up with recommendations for the next council meeting.
17. CENTRAL AIR & HEATING. Mayor Kendrick directed Clerk to proceed with getting figures on the central air and heating for the Town Hall.

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TOWN OF CINCO BAYOU
CIVIL DEFENSE OPERATING PLAN
NATURAL DISASTER

I. GENERAL

A. Authority:

1. Florida Emergency Operation Plan 1971.
2. Florida Statutes Chapter 252 as amended.
3. Florida Executive Order, Current.
4. Public Law 93-288.
5. Okaloosa County Resolution No. 6BP-42, dated October 31, 1961.
6. Town of Cinco Bayou Resolution No. 76-1, February 12, 1976.
7. Town of Cinco Bayou Council Minutes, June 15, 1978.

B. Reference:

Okaloosa County Civil Defense Plan 1976.

C. Purpose:

1. To outline the Town of Cinco Bayou operational policies to be followed, and procedures to be used in taking coordinated action against a natural disaster or a man-oriented disaster, other than war related.

D. Mission:

1. To provide for the protection of lives and property, the preservation of public health, and the maintenance of welfare among the people of the Town of Cinco Bayou in the face of a threat, or actual occurrence of a disaster.
2. To provide for the rapid, orderly recovery from the effects of a natural disaster.

E. Definitions:

1. Natural disaster: Any hurricane, tropical storm, fire, tornado, flood, earthquake, drought, accident (auto-truck-ship-airplane-industrial-etc.) or natural catastrophe resulting in abnormally severe damages, casualties, and/or other adverse effects, to man, livestock, agriculture, business, and industry.

2. Major Disaster: Any hurricane, storm, fire, flood, drought, earthquake, or other catastrophe, which in the determination of the President is, or threatens to be of sufficient severity and magnitude to warrant disaster assistance by the Federal Government to supplement efforts and resources of State and Local governments.

II. ORGANIZATION FOR A NATURAL DISASTER

- A. The Director of the Division of Emergency Government is the State Disaster Operations Coordinator.
- B. The West Florida Civil Defense Area Coordinator is the Assistant Disaster Operations Coordinator for the sixteen county west area, which includes Okaloosa County.
- C. The Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director is the County Disaster Operations Coordinator. These two terms are synonymous. Operating under the supervision and control of the Okaloosa County Board of Commissioners, he is responsible for the coordination of all services and resources available and used within Okaloosa County, during the periods of emergency and recovery therefrom. He is responsible for the development and execution of the natural disaster plan among the County Government, the Red Cross, Local Civil Defense Directors and Civil Defense resources that are available from Federal and State Governments.
- D. The Town of Cinco Bayou's Civil Defense Director will coordinate and cooperate with the Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director. He is responsible for the coordination of all services and resources available and used within the Town of Cinco Bayou, during the periods of emergency and recovery therefrom: He is responsible for the development and execution of the natural disaster plan among the Town Government, the various local emergency and civil units and agencies, and the County Civil Defense Director.

III. OVERALL RESPONSIBILITIES IN A NATURAL DISASTER EMERGENCY

- A. Responsibilities of the Town of Cinco Bayou Civil Defense
 1. Staff and maintain an interim Emergency Operations Center (EOC) for the duration of the emergency.
 2. Issuance of timely, official warnings, and designation of hazardous areas after notification by the Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director (OCCDD). If the disaster originates locally, the OCCDD will immediately be notified and his concurrence and cooperation will be solicited

3. With the concurrence of the OCCDD, all persons in threatened danger zones or areas will be evacuated.
4. Coordinate all town governmental departments and agencies in combatting the natural disaster.

B. County Sheriff's Department

Note: The Town of Cinco Bayou is dependent on the County Sheriff's Department for its police protection.

1. Enforcement of Law and Order.
2. Assist in any evacuation and warning of the residents of the Town of Cinco Bayou deemed necessary.
3. Keep the interim EOC informed of roads and bridge conditions and cause the closing of same at his discretion if danger to life and property exist.
4. Direct and control the flow of traffic.
5. Assist the interim EOC with communications.

C. Town Engineer

1. Alert and place on duty, as needed, his entire department.
2. Assure his department heads and foremen are aware of their duties.
3. Keep all roads and bridges clear for traffic.
4. Make certain all town equipment is ready for operation.
5. If additional equipment is required so notify the Town Civil Defense Director so proper request can be made to the OCCDD.
6. Make certain that all water tanks are full and secure to insure against water system disruption.

D. Fire Chief

Note: The Town of Cinco Bayou has agreement with Fort Walton Beach Fire Department.

1. Alert and place on duty, as needed his entire department.
2. Make certain all fire fighting equipment is ready for operation.
3. Recognizing that fire fighting constitutes his prime responsibility, if possible, assist the Civil Defense Director in necessary evacuation and warning.

IV. OPERATIONAL CONDITIONS (OPCONS)

A. Purpose of OPCONS

1. A set of five operational conditions is used in the State of Florida to facilitate sending out warning and alerts. A natural disaster warning or alert usually originates with the State Civil Defense Agency in Jacksonville. It is transmitted to the West Florida Civil Defense Area in Tallahassee, then to the Okaloosa County Civil Defense, and then to the Town of Cinco Bayou Civil Defense. A typical warning or alert such as "OPCON 3 is in effect in Okaloosa County, Hurricane ANNA now definitely threatening", is clear, but the term OPCON 3 must be understood.

B. Natural Disaster OPCONS

Under natural disaster conditions, either OPCON 3 or 5 will be used. (OPCON 1, 2, and 4 refer only to enemy action).

1. OPCON 3 - Definition: A state of natural disaster is imminent or actually exists in the State of Florida, or in the Civil Defense Areas, Districts, or Counties named.
2. OPCON 5 - Definition: Natural disaster or emergency conditions are over and resumption of normal everyday operations are possible. However, in the event of local damage, this may be only the beginning of the recovery period.

C. Understanding of OPCONS

1. The Town of Cinco Bayou Civil Defense Director will make certain that all town agency representatives and alternates to be contacted in the event of the setting of an OPCON thoroughly understand the meaning of the OPCON and the course of action to be taken. There will be no time to explain during the alerting period.
2. Each agency head, in turn, will make certain that all persons in his agency understand the meaning of the OPCON.

V. RECEIPT OF, AND ACTION ON RECEIPT OF AN OPCON IN CINCO BAYOU

- A. The Town of Cinco Bayou Civil Defense Director will receive the OPCON setting from the Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director. In the event, the notification is received from some other channel or the disaster originates locally, the OCCDD will be contacted for verification, concurrence, and cooperation.

B. Specific Action to be Taken

Note: OPCON 3 may be set with no prior warning. On receipt of OPCON 3 the following actions will be taken which constitutes PHASE I of a natural disaster emergency:

1. Man the Interim Emergency Operating Center (IEOC) located at Town Hall, Cinco Bayou for continuous operation. Place communications on a continuous basis.
 2. Notify those on the Staff Alerting List of the OPCON and instruct them to report to the I.E.O.C. for briefing and instruction.
 3. Alert the population of Cinco Bayou by all means at hand in accordance with an alerting pre-plan.
 4. Working with the Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director and his agencies, cause to be evacuated all persons in dangerous or potentially dangerous areas, locations or buildings. Evacuation will be in accordance with and to areas designated in an evacuation pre-plan.
- C. After disaster strikes the Town of Cinco Bayou, the Civil Defense Director will take additional specific action which will constitute PHASE II.
1. Request the Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director to activate the the Okaloosa Disaster Survey Team to initiate:
 - a. Preliminary survey of casualties.
 - b. Preliminary survey of damages to all public facilities.
 - c. Preliminary survey of damages to private property.
 2. Keep the OCCDD fully informed on all disaster conditions.
 3. If warranted, determine relief requirements beyond local capabilities and transmit to the OCCDD.
- D. OPCON 5, Specific action to be Taken
1. The Town of Cinco Bayou Civil Defense Director, on receipt of OPCON 5, will notify all officials and the entire population that normal operation may be resumed.
 2. In consultation with all Town Officials, he will determine continuing hazardous conditions and danger areas throughout the community and give these conditions and areas the widest possible immediate publicity. In critical areas he will cause the erection of barricades, or placing of guards to keep people out until corrective measures are taken.

3. In the event that the Town of Cinco Bayou along or in conjunction with Okaloosa County is declared a "Major Disaster Area", the Civil Defense Director in cooperation with Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director, the Okaloosa County Disaster Survey Team, all Town and County Governmental agencies, and all relief agencies will make necessary surveys and estimates to comply with the provisions of Office of Emergency Planning Circulars 4000.4, B "Natural Disaster Manual for State and Local Applicants", and 4000.5, C "Instructions to Applicants, Natural Disaster Program". (Note: These manuals are the official Regulations for the State of Florida governing the administration of Federal disaster assistance. One copy of each is maintained in the Office of the Director, and one copy of each is provided for the use of the Disaster Survey Team).

VI. REPORTS

- A. Natural disaster operations being of an emergency nature, require rapid reporting of accurate information. All reporting will be done to the Okaloosa County Civil Defense Director in a manner most suited to the situation and the information content to be provided.

VII. The Town of Cinco Bayou Civil Defense Operating Plan for Natural Disasters is hereby approved:

AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

AGREEMENT made this 15th day of June, 1978, by and between the Town of Cinco Bayou, Florida, hereinafter referred to as "Town" and Frank L. Mills, Sheriff of Okaloosa County, florida, hereinafter referred to as "Sheriff's Department".

In consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter enumerated, the Town and the Sheriff's Department hereby agree as follows:

1. The Sheriff's Department shall provide full police protection and law enforcement service to the Town and its citizens, beginning June 17, 1978, and continuing through September 30, 1979.

2. The Town shall pay to the Sheriff's Department the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) per month beginning with the month of July, 1978. Each such payment for services provided hereunder shall be made payable to the order of "Okaloosa County Sheriff's Department" and shall be paid by the 10th of each month for that month.

3. Any deputy of the Sheriff's Department on duty within the Cinco zone may act as the law enforcement representative of the Town in the enforcement of Town ordinances, of Okaloosa County ordinances and of State of Florida laws.

4. As part of the services rendered to the Town, the Sheriff's Department shall: (a) open and close Leyenda, Francis and Laguna Parks and also Glenwood Park, if it is fenced during the term of this contract. Park opening and closing times will be set periodically based on season, and the Town shall inform the Sheriff's Department by written memorandum of the prevailing times; and (b) patrol within corporate limits and provide security checks for residential and business establishments, ~~upon individual requests.~~

RESOLUTION NO. 78-3

WHEREAS, certain areas of the Town of Cinco Bayou, Florida, are subject to periodic flooding, mudslides (i. e., mudflows), or flood-related erosion, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this council to require the recognition and evaluation of flood, mudslide (i. e., mudflow), or flood-related erosion hazards in all official actions relating to land use in areas having these hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to Florida Statute 166.021,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council of Cinco Bayou, Florida, hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it will enact as necessary, and maintain in force in those areas having flood, mudslide (i. e., mudflow), or flood-related erosion hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests THE TOWN COUNCIL, A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

(a) Assist the Administrator, at his request, in his delineation of the limits of the area having special flood, mudslide (i. e., mudflow), or flood-related erosion hazards.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain, mudslide (i. e., mudflow) or flood-related erosion areas.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain, mudslide (i. e., mudflow), or flood-related erosion areas, and cooperation with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain, mudslide

(i. e., mudflow) and/or flood-related erosion areas in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.

(e) Upon occurrence, notify the Administrator in writing whenever the boundaries of the community have been modified by annexation or the community has otherwise assumed or no longer has authority to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations for a particular area. In order that all Flood Hazard Boundary Maps and Flood Insurance Rate Maps accurately represent the community's boundaries, include within such notification a copy of a map of the community suitable for reproduction, clearly delineating the new corporate limits or new area for which the community has assumed or relinquished flood plain management regulatory authority.

3. Appoints THE TOWN COUNCIL, A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request, for the determination of applicable flood insurance risk premium rates within all areas having special flood hazards identified on a Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, any certificates of flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest habitable floor (including basement if habitable) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed;

4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.


