Therefore, aquorum being present, Mayor Kendrick opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m.

1. TRUCK BIDS. Recommendation were made to buy a 1977 Ford Super Cab Pickup priced at \$6767 or a O'Connor Ford priced at \$6092.39 from Gary Smith for the Town's use to take care of the Town's maintenance work.
2. HUMANE SOCIETY-ANIMAL CONTROL. Mayor directed Clerk to check further into this subject and report at next Council as Committee meeting.
3. ORDINANCE-REZONING BLOCKS 4 & 5 FROM R-1 (RESIDENTIAL) TO C-1 (LIMITED COMMERCIAL). First reading of ordinance will be at the Regular Council Meeting on July 21, 1977.
4. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DUES-INCREASE FROM \$60 to \$125. Recommendations were made by Mr. Peek to pay the increase dues from \$60 to \$125.
5. STREET LIGHT - OPP BOULEVARD. Mayor Kendrick directed Clerk to proceed with putting up a street light on Opp Boulevard.
6. REPORT ON WORK IN PROGRESS/COMPLETED. Recommendations were made by Mrs. Balsley to upgrade Leyenda Park. Clerk indicated that about \$2600 will be spent to improve park which includes installing sprinkler system, pump, electrical power, fencing, fertilizing the grass. Mayor Kendrick subjected to Mrs. Balsley that this matter be held for another week.

May Contract Dog Control

CINCO BAYOU—Cinco Mayor Jim Kendrick and his council agreed Wednesday to consider contracting with the local Humane Society in light of recent discussions concerning which portions of Okaloosa County will fall under the wing of an animal control ordinance recently adopted by commissioners.

The council was told by Cinco manager Jim Godwin that the town held a contract with the society "about ten years ago" but that it had not been in effect since before he took over as town manager.

The council's concern may well be in vain, however, in light of agreements recently reached between County Sheriff Frank Mills and Okaloosa commissioners.

Both Mills and Commissioner Mike Mitchell agreed during a meeting earlier this week that the county's newly adopted animal control ordinance applies to, and will be enforced, in all areas of the county except those municipalities, such as Fort Walton Beach, that holds its own separate contracts with the Humane Society.

A Saturday meeting with Society Manager Jean Luciana has been set up to work out a solution and possible contract for the town that is "thick in dogs," as one

councilman said.

In the past any work by the society in the town was on an "on-call basis" for emergency service.

Kendricks said he hoped the society would continue to serve in an emergency situation until a solution could be worked out.

Councilwoman Irene Balsley told fellow councilmen she would recommend at next week's council session that another \$2,600 of the already allocated parks budget be spent on the upgrading of Leyenda Park.

The park, situated at the corner of Yacht Club Drive and Kidd Street, is Balsley's next target in the fencing and grassing of all the town's parks. The projected improvements include fencing, adding a sprinkler system and pump, as well as more picnic tables and fertilizer for the grass.

The town had budgeted over \$8,000 for park expenditures and as of last month there was \$4,000 left in the park coffers.

Other business to be brought up to the regular council meeting will be the first reading of an ordinance for rezoning two blocks from residential to limited commercial.

The rezoning request involves blocks 4 and 5 which are bounded by Yacht Club Drive, Lucille Street, Seaway Avenue and Francis Park.
