Attached, please find a press release regarding the Grand Opening and Official Dedication of the new Cinco Bayou Town Hall on Tuesday, September 26, 1989 at 5:30 p.m. It is an affair and a town worthy of note.

As you are aware, Cinco Bayou is that cozy little municipality nestled right in the middle of Fort Walton Beach - sort of like the hole in the middle of a doughnut. It is a community that has traditionally followed a different road than many other small towns in the region. Cinco Bayou was one of the first towns in the state to approve recycling and the Town Council didn't stop there - the town of Cinco Bayou is paying for the recycling program for each and every one of its residents!

Another "CINCO" innovation is a stringent tree law - designed to insure that the trees of the town were protected for now and for the future. Some of Cinco Bayou's prettiest streets are almost totally canopied by majestic oaks - and they'll stay that way for generations to come as a result of tough environmental ordinances.

The new Cinco Bayou Town Hall exemplifies the small community's fascination with the aesthetic lifestyle. Designed by a Pensacola architect in a style reminiscent of beachfront Florida in the early 1900's, the building is sided all in rough cedar, and trimmed in pale blue and white. The hall boasts a huge open-air deck, which will serve as the platform for the monthly town picnics, attended by town officials and citizens alike. And there are more than enough windows for a view of the serene waterfront on which the building rests. It's an elegant architectural marvel that enhances the public park in which it resides; the hall is aesthetically and environmentally consistent with the ambience of the little community.

(Cinco Bayou, Florida) Elected officials of this small Florida community welcomed guests and residents to the Grand Opening and Dedication of the new Town Hall today at 5:30 p.m. The 2500 square foot building was designed by a local architect, and entirely sided with rough cedar. The huge open-air deck faces the waters of Cinco Bayou, and will serve as the forum for this quaint town's monthly picnics and municipal get-togethers.

"It's totally consistent with the tone that our community has set for itself," said Mayor Chuck Laginess on Tuesday, "and it's the culmination of a year of planning and design by the entire Town Council." The festivities included a ribbon cutting and catered affair for dignitaries and residents alike.

"It's great to see this come to fruition," said Councilman Joe Skelly. "We were charged with creating a Town Hall that would enhance the utility and aesthetics of this beautiful park for our citizens. I am genuinely proud that we did that and much, much more."

The new Town Hall is a functional addition to Leyenda Park, a scenic waterfront park in the center of the small Florida municipality. The park is open to the public.
