### Looking for a venue for your next Special Occasion?

Give us a call; maybe we can help. Our Town Hall or one of our parks may be just the spot you are looking for.

The Town shall levy fees for the rental of the Town Hall facilities for activities including, but not limited to meetings, luncheons, dinners, receptions, and specialty activities (card games, board games, etc.) for both commercial and noncommercial use. The amount of the rental fee will be assessed, as follows: Food to be served at a Community room/event: \$150.00. A community Room/event without food: \$100.00. For training sessions, seminars or other meetings primarily attended by elected and/or appointed government officials there will be no fee charged or deposit required, unless a registration fee is charged for the event. In that event, a facility use fee of \$25.00 will be charged. There will be no fee charged or security deposit required for use by residents of the Town unless the premises are not left clean and free of trash or debris after the event. If that condition is found present by the Town staff then a \$25.00 cleaning fee will be assessed to the facility user. Non-profit organizations will be charged \$50.00 with a refundable security deposit of \$50.00 unless a waiver is granted by the Town Manager/Clerk.

## MOSQUITOES ARE BACK!!!!

Listed below are suggestions from the Okaloosa County Mosquito Control District to help combat mosquito infestation.

1. Drill holes in the bottom of any garbage or recycling containers stored outdoors. Holes on the sides, still allow enough water to accumulate in the bottom for mosquitoes to breed.
2. Keep gutters clean and unclogged. Be sure downspouts drain properly, without leaving puddles in the drainage area. It may be necessary to reroute down-spouts or add extensions to carry water away.
3. Keep swimming pools cleaned and chlorinated, even when not in use. Homeowners who go on vacation without chlorinating their pools may return to a mosquito hatchery.
4. Walk the property after a rain and look for areas in the landscape that are not draining well. If you find puddles that remain for four or more days, regrade the area.

5. Ornamental ponds should be aerated to keep water moving and discourage mosquitoes from laying eggs. Alternately, the pond can be stocked with mosquito-eating fish called gambusia. The Okaloosa County Mosquitoes Control District maintains gambusia hatcheries across the County and may provide you with a starter stock depending on demand.
6. Dump anything that holds water twice per week if it has rained. Birdbaths, non-chlorinated wading pools, footbaths, garbage can lids, and pottery will all attract breeding mosquitoes. Remember to empty the saucers under your flower pots, and don't leave water in pet bowls for more than two days.
7. Keep your property clean of items that can hold water, including discarded aluminum cans and tires.
8. Adult mosquitoes rest during the day, usually on tall weeds or other vegetation. Make the yard less hospitable to mosquitoes by mowing regularly, and keep weeds away from the home foundation.
